#### **2022 Populus Fund Scoring Matrix**

#### **Eligibility**

Union staff will do a first pass of all applications to determine the eligibility of the applicant including answering the question of "Is this project a visual art project, or does it have a visual arts component?"

# **Artistic Vision – 50%,** (Jurors will give each applicant a score of **0–10** in this category)

This aspect of the scoring process has the most weight within the overall score of the applicant. Through this section, we want jurors to look at the innovative, artistic, and creative strength of the proposed project and overall vision of the applicant(s). We are defining Innovation as: projects that exemplify new ways of working in, for, and with the public. An innovative project will be one that connects with the community in an exciting, creative, thoughtful, and radically accessible way through art. Their vision for the goals and outcomes of the project is very clear.

**Community Impact – 30%,** (Jurors will give each applicant a score of **0–6** in this category)

This aspect of the scoring process holds the second most weight within the overall score of the applicant. Through this section, we want jurors to evaluate the level of community collaboration or involvement within the project.

Ideal projects will incorporate collaboration with the public. Funds can be used for the research, development, and creation of public-facing new work, a project, or performance. Public engagement can occur via process, presentation, production, or publication. This may include exhibitions, performances, events, lectures, workshops, screenings, readings, publications, residencies, programming at artist-run-spaces, online projects, etc. Projects cannot be presented at art museums or commercial galleries.

Applicants should be able to clearly communicate the engagement that will occur through their project, and the impact that will have on their intended audience and community.

# **Project Capacity – 10%** (Jurors will give each applicant a score of **0–2** in this category)

This section evaluates the feasibility of the project, and whether the scope and implementation of this project are clear. This includes the roles partners and participants will play in the project. The applicant's timeline and budget clearly and accurately reflect the proposed project. It is reasonable that this project will be fully in-progress, having made significant steps toward the point of being ready for engagement with, or presentation to, the public by June 2023.

### Accessibility + COVID-19 Safety – 10%, (Jurors will give each applicant a score of 0–2 in this category)

This section looks at the accessibility of the resulting project to the public as either an in-person or online event, project, or program. The Union is committed to removing barriers to the arts by providing programs, facilities, and services that are accessible to everyone regardless of race, ethnicity, gender expression, sexual identity, income level, age, physicality, or disability.

All projects must have a demonstrated effort to incorporate COVID-19 safety protocols that prioritize the health and safety of participants and community during the development and execution of the project. While we know these recommendations re: COVID-19 safety are always changing, projects should be adaptable to address any COVID-19 impacts.
